Mr Roger Corbett AO (Chairman)

John Conde is Chairman of Energy Australia, Bupa Australia Health Pty Ltd, Whitehaven Coal Limited, Sydney Symphony, Events New South Wales, Homebush Motor Racing Authority Advisory Board, the Australian Olympic Committee (NSW) Funding Committee and the Dermatology Research Foundation. He is President of the Commonwealth Remuneration Tribunal and a Director of Dexus Property Group. He is also a member of the Bond University's Board of Trustee Members. Mr Conde was granted an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) in 1994 in recognition of service to business and commerce, particularly in the field of electricity generation and supply to the community.

Professor Patricia Davidson



Professor Patricia Davidson (Trish) is the Director of Kaleidoscope including the Children's Hospital in Newcastle and the pro-tem Director of Child and Youth Health for HNE LHN. Trish qualified from Glasgow University in 1978, immigrated to Australia in 1985 and after five years at RCH, Melbourne became Director of Paediatric Surgery in Newcastle in 1991. Trish served as elected councillor and Censor-in-Chief of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons. In 2006 she was awarded the Sir Louis Barnett Medal for her singular contributions to surgical education in Australia and New Zealand; the first woman to do so. She continues as an accreditor for the Australian Medical Council and is on the Clinical Council of the Clinical Excellence Commission.

In August 2002 Trish became the Director of Kaleidoscope; the newly created Hunter Children's Health Network integrating the John Hunter Children's Hospital with Community Child and Youth Health. In 2008 Trish was awarded the Clinical Leader of the Year award for her contributions to HNE. Following the recommendations from the Special Commission of Inquiry into Acute Care Services in NSW she has served on the NSW Director General's NSW Kids Transition Governance and Implementation Groups.

Associate Professor Michael Fasher



A/Prof Michael Fasher is a conjoint Associate Professor University of Western Sydney and an Adjunct Associate Professor University of Sydney. He is General Practitioner in Blacktown and has worked as a health care provider in western Sydney for over 30 years. He is a member of the Management Committee of the Blacktown Medical Practitioners Association and is involved in the education of parent groups in the community, medical students and registrars in Vocational General Practice Training.

Clinical Associate Professor Alyson Kakakios



A/Prof Alyson Kakakios is the Head of the Department of Allergy and Immunology at The Children's Hospital at Westmead and a Clinical Associate Professor in the Discipline of Paediatrics and Child Health at the University of Sydney. She is a Senior Staff Specialist and has a large clinical practice, caring for children and young people with allergic or immunologic disorders. She is in charge of the Immunology Laboratory at The Children's Hospital at Westmead, which performs specialised investigations in the area of primary immunodeficiency. She is active in clinical research and has published extensively in leading peer-reviewed clinical journals. She is the Director of the NSW Anaphylaxis Training Programme, established at The Children's Hospital at Westmead in 2009 and has

been a member of the NSW Health Anaphylaxis Working Party for many years. She was a core member of the Commonwealth-appointed Australian Drug Evaluation Committee for eight years.

Alyson is the elected Chairman of the Medical Staff Council of The Children's Hospital at Westmead and is actively involved in the NSW Medical Staff Executive Council.

Mrs Renata Kaldor AO



Renata Kaldor has been involved in business, education, law and community affairs over a number of years. She is currently a Director of ASI Pty Ltd, a Trustee of Sydney Opera House, a Judicial Commissioner in NSW, a Director of The Institute of Multicultural Diversity at UTS, Member of the Advisory Council of Alzheimer's NSW and a Member of The NSW Health Care Advisory Council. Dr Richard Matthews is the Deputy Director-General of the Strategic Development Division at NSW Health. Until June 2007, Richard carried a dual role as Deputy Director-General and Chief Executive of Justice Health. He commenced his career in general practice and developed a special interest in drug and alcohol. He has worked for many years at St. Vincent's Hospital Rankin Court Methadone Stabilisation Unit. His association with Justice Health (previously known as Corrections Health Service) began in 1992 when he assumed responsibility for administration of the Methadone Maintenance Program. He was appointed Director of Drug and Alcohol Services for Justice Health in 1993, Director of Clinical Services in 1998 and Chief Executive Officer in 1999. Dr Michael McGlynn OAM



Dr Michael McGlynn is a Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon at Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick and a Conjoint Senior Lecturer at the University of NSW. He has held VMO or Staff Specialist positions in the public health sector since 1980, as well as working in private practice. He has been a Councillor of the Australian Society of Plastic Surgeons, President of the NSW Chapter of Plastic Surgeons, Supervisor of Training in Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at Prince of Wales Hospital and Sydney Children's Hospital, Chair of the NSW Regional Training Sub-committee of the RACS and Chair of the Board of Training in Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery of the RACS for Australia and New Zealand. He is currently Executive Clinical Director of the SESIAHS and Co-chair of its Clinical Council, a member of the Council of the NSW Clinical Excellence Commission and Co-Chair of the NSW Statewide Hospital Network Review Group. Professor Ralph Nanan



Professor Nanan is the Chair of Paediatrics, Sydney Medical School Nepean, The University of Sydney. As a clinical academic at Nepean Hospital, he is responsible for clinical supervision and teaching in paediatrics and is Sub-Dean of Research. Formerly, Director of Paediatrics, Nepean Hospital and Former Staff Specialist, Department of Neonatal and Paediatric Intensive Care, Wuersburg Germany.

Professor Kim Oates AM



Professor Kim Oates was Chief Executive of The Children's Hospital at Westmead from 1997 to 2006. Prior to being appointed to this role, he held various positions at the Hospital, including Community Paediatrician, Head of the Child Protection Unit, Head of the Child Development Unit and Children's Assessment Centre and Director of Medical Services. He was the Foundation Douglas Burrows Professor of Paediatrics and Child Health at the University of Sydney 1985-1997, a position he held simultaneously with that of Chair of the Division of Medicine at The Children's Hospital at Westmead. He has been President of the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect, Inaugural Chair of the New South Wales Child Death Review Team, chaired the Federal Government's National Council on the Prevention of Child Abuse and is a former President of Children's Hospitals Australasia. He has received a range of national and international awards for his research in child protection and for his advocacy for children. He is currently Emeritus Professor at the University of Sydney and Director of Undergraduate Quality and Safety at the Clinical Excellence Commission. Professor Oates was awarded the Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in 1996 for service to medicine, particularly in the field of paediatrics and the welfare of children.

Mr Daniel Petre AO



Daniel Petre has been a leading player in Australia's technology industry for more than 20 years, and has held leadership positions in technology-based businesses in Australia and the USA. His experience includes nine years with Microsoft Corporation, where he served as Vice President of the Workgroup Division, Director of Advanced Technology and Director of the Asia Pacific Region. He was part of a global team responsible for developing Microsoft's services in the areas of multimedia development, online services and interactive television and worked closely with Bill Gates to develop products and strategies for the workgroup computing market, including Microsoft Exchange and Outlook. More recently, Daniel founded ecorp as a subsidiary of Publishing and Broadcasting Limited (PBL) and developed it to become Australia's leading technology-focused investment company. Most recently, he continued his work in establishing internet-focused companies when he founded Netus (in 2005). He has served on a wide range of corporate and not-for-profit boards and, in 2001, he founded the Petre Foundation with his wife Carolyn. Mr Petre was awarded the Officer of the Order of Australia in 2005 in recognition for service to business, particularly in information technology, and to the community through philanthropic support for medical research, promotion of work/life balance and educational organisations.

Professor Bruce Robinson



Professor Robinson is an Endocrinologist and Head of the Cancer Genetics Laboratory in the Kolling Institute at Royal North Shore Hospital. He was appointed Acting Dean of the Faculty of Medicine in the University of Sydney in April 2006 and Dean in March 2007. Professor Robinson graduated from the University of Sydney in 1980 and then undertook studies for a Master of Science degree. His further molecular research work was performed at the Brigham and Women's Hospital and the Children's Hospital, Harvard Medical School from 1986-1989 and he was awarded a Doctorate of Medicine from the University of Sydney in 1990. He has developed and led the Cancer Genetics Laboratory since 1990. He has published over 200 peer-reviewed scientific articles. In 2003, Professor

Robinson was awarded the Daiichi Prize by the Asia and Oceania Thyroid Association for this work on the pathogenesis of thyroid cancer. Prior to his current University appointment, Professor Robinson was Associate Dean (International) in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Sydney and was Head of the Division of Medicine at the Royal North Shore Hospital from 1998-2006. He also served on the Council of the Endocrine Society of Australia from 2001-2005. He was awarded the People's Health Medal by the Vietnamese Government in 2008. He is a Fellow of the Australian Institute of Company Directors.

Dr Robyn Shields AM



Dr Robyn Shields AM, is currently working at Royal Prince Alfred Hospital. Robyn has previously worked in mental health, developing mainstream Aboriginal mental health services in NSW in partnership with the Aboriginal Medical Service at Redfern. She has also been responsible for developing services for Aboriginal inmates at Corrections Health Service, now known as Justice Health. Robyn remains actively involved in mental health and continues her role as a NSW Mental Health Review Tribunal Member. Robyn has contributed to developing state and national policies and service development in Aboriginal Health and Aboriginal Mental Health and has been a member of the NSW Child

Death Review Committee, the Aboriginal Health and Medical Research Council of NSW Ethics Committee and the National Health and Medical Research Committee - Indigenous Health. Robyn has a special interest in working with disadvantaged groups and encouraging positive working partnerships to enhance capacity building in the community. In 2002, Robyn was awarded a Centenary Medal and in 2004 was awarded the Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in recognition of her services to Aboriginal Mental Health.

Professor Peter Smith



Professor Peter Smith is Dean of Medicine at The University of New South Wales. He specialised in paediatric clinical oncology and research following study in Australia, USA and Germany. Peter has held senior hospital management posts in Brisbane and Melbourne and senior academic appointments at the Universities of Queensland, Melbourne and Auckland. He is a Group Captain, RAAF SR and Clinical Director, Health Administration and Education, Directorate of Health Reserves, Air Force and has served as a consultant to government, including as Chair of the Inquiry into Vietnam Veterans Cancer Incidence and Mortality. Peter is currently a Director of St Vincent's Health Australia, Garvan Institute of Medical Research, Arts and Health Foundation and a number of other research centres

and institutes.

Associate Professor Donna Waters



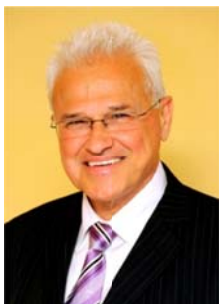
